The Sanders House: Oldest Residence in the City

If a man on the street would be asked if he knew (or cared) where the location of the oldest residence in the city was located, most wouldn't know. Few would guess Bates Hendricks. And yet the Sanders House, located at 1020 Palmer, and built in c. 1820 (one year before Indianapolis was founded) is probably the oldest home in the city of Indianapolis.



This large brick house is skewed at an angle different than all the other houses in the neighborhood. Positioned across from old IPS School #18 (Horizon Center), the house was once perched on a hill overlooking Pleasant Run Creek, facing south. The floor beams show the hand tooled marks of an ax. The wooden peg connections of some of these beams likewise point to an early construction. Six fireplaces represent an early form of central heating. Much of the plaster on the walls contains horsehair. The style of architecture is that of the southern "I" fashion with a central hallway with a narrow staircase to the second floor.

Legend has it that the Delaware Native Americans once populated the banks of the Pleasant Run Creek. They may have interacted with the builders of the Sanders house. Those interactions may not have always been friendly. According to some stories, William Sanders had to quit building the house when it was half finished after a disagreement with the Regardless, it is amazing indeed to think that most of us walk by almost 190 years of history every time we walk down Palmer Street.


Letter from The President:

Rhubarb crisp a dessert with a rolled oats and butter and cinnamon topping. Cook Time: 55 minutes

Ingredients:

- 1 cup light brown sugar, firmly packed
- 1 cup all-purpose flour
- 3/4 cup quick cooking rolled oats
- 1/2 cup melted butter
- 1 teaspoon cinnamon
- 4 cups sliced rhubarb
- 1 cup granulated sugar
- 2 tablespoons cornstarch
- 1 teaspoon vanilla
- 1 cup water

Preparation:

In mixing bowl, combine brown sugar, flour, oats, butter and cinnamon; mix together until crumbly. Press half of the brown sugar and oats mixture into a buttered 8-inch square baking dish. Top with the sliced rhubarb.

In a saucepan combine 1 cup granulated sugar, cornstarch, and the 1 cup of water and vanilla. Cook together until clear, then pour over rhubarb.

Top rhubarb with remaining crumb mixture and bake at 350° for 45 to 55 minutes.
