Come to the Third Annual Street Fest on August 3!



Our Third annual Street Fest is almost here! This year is shaping up to be our biggest and busiest of them all. The Events Committee has been working hard to recruit your favorite vendors and we're happy to share that we'll have free food, a food truck, five beverage vendors, three bands, and over 20 local artists and community partners! New this year, Street Fest will feature a family-friendly area with an interactive animal exhibit, crafts, games, and a music show from Mr. Daniel.

Street Fest is a yearly event designed to build community through free and low-cost activities and is held at the corner of **Lincoln Street and New Jersey Street on August 3 from 5:00pm to 9:00pm**. Entry is free with a requested donation of school supplies for our local schools. The after-party will be held at Bowhaus Tap (1729 S. East Street) at 9:00pm for adults 21 years and over.

Nearby residents can expect street closures after 3:00pm and it is requested that residents on these streets move their cars off the street by Noon on August 3. Roads will reopen by 10:00pm after vendors have packed up.

Neighborhood Engagement & Community Assets Planning Survey

A School That Makes SENSE for Our Neighborhood



Do you wish you had a great elementary school option for your children? One that is close to home and/or work where you can feel sure that they are getting the quality education they need? A school that understands your needs and works with families to provide a better future for your children?

You found it! Southeast Neighborhood School of Excellence (SENSE) is a free public school, serving the Bates-Hendricks, Fountain Square, and Garfield Park neighborhoods. SENSE offers a supportive environment that focuses on working with your children to help them achieve their best.

Founded in 2004, the school serves grades K-8. Bus service is available for most students. Classrooms are limited to 25 students. A food and uniform clothing pantry is available for students and their families as well.

SENSE now has open enrollment for new families. You can enroll directly at the school, which is located at 1601 S. Barth Ave. 46203. Or, apply online at SENSEINDY.org For more information, call 317-423-0204. School began Monday, July 22, but they continue to take enrollments throughout the school year.

SENSE Cub Scouts Enjoy Camp Belzer

During the week of June 17 to 21, some of the members of the SENSE Charter School Cub Scouts, Pack 18, enjoyed a week of day camping at Camp Belzer. This camp is one of a variety of year-round camping activities offered by Crossroads of America Council.

Camp Belzer is an exciting program for Tigers, Wolves, Bears, Webelos and Arrow of Light Scouts. The camp is situated on a wooded, 100-acre facility in Indianapolis that has been in development for over 90 years. Camp Belzer was created to provide a safe environment where Cub Scouts can learn, advance, and play in the great outdoors. Activities include swimming, shooting BB guns and gun safety, archery, crafts, rafting, cooking, and campfires.




Bates-Hendricks Neighborhood Association
