SENSE Resumes Practical Lessons Measuring Water Pollution

In May, eighth-grade SENSE Charter School science teacher, Adam Botsford, took his class down to the Barth Street Bridge area for water testing. He resumed this class lesson after a pause of almost two years – of course due to COVID health concerns. It is exciting to have this important lesson back and implemented.

Mr. Botsford's students studied the effects of pollution waterways earlier in the school year. They then went down to the creek just south of SENSE Charter School, and the students used different methods to tell how healthy or unhealthy waterway is at that site. The students used chemical indicators to test for pH, dissolved oxygen, nitrogen levels, phosphorus levels, coliform levels, turbidity, and temperature. The students also collected water samples to



find the different macroinvertebrates to see how polluted the waters were based off of the tolerance levels of the different organisms they found. SENSE Charter strives to impart lessons to students that give real-life understanding of environmental problems.

"The test was important because when the students are reading about pollution, it is only words", said Mr. Botsford. "When showing the students about pollution, that is a real-life lesson."

Today's students will hopefully become the problem solvers of the future. If environmental problems – such as those related to water quality – are ever going to be solved, students must be environmentally literate.

SENSE Students Try On Different Careers

Ms. Carley Forese and Mrs. Crystal Brewster's SENSE Charter School Kindergarten class were recently learning about community helpers for two weeks. This gave students an up-close look at different career paths and connected their learning to the real world. Students were invited to come to school dressed up as a community helper and/or a job they wanted to have when they grow up. Many of the "doctors" and "nurses" stopped school staff often to take their temperature and listen to their heartbeat.


