Letter from the President

Hello neighbors! I am happy to share that we received a grant from the City of Indianapolis! Thanks to the hard work of neighbors Lois Quigley, Greg Allen, and Zach Schalk, along with support from the Bates-Hendricks Quality of Life Committee, Representative Justin Moed, and Southeast Neighborhood Development (SEND), our neighborhood will receive the funds needed to install eight high-quality benches on the New Jersey esplanades!

The funds for the benches come from the City of Indianapolis Neighborhood Grants program. Our neighborhood was one of twenty-six organizations in Indianapolis to receive a portion of the nearly \$220,000 that will be distributed to the organizations. The purpose of the funds is to help our community grow and encourage neighbor

engagement. We determined that new benches would be a great way of achieving those goals and the City agreed.

The benches will be placed at four locations, two benches per location, along the existing paths on the 1400 and 1500 blocks of South New Jersey Street. The benches will face each other as a way to encourage conversation between neighbors and friends walking along the paths. The benches will be low maintenance and are expected to last for many years.

We are finalizing plans for the installation and look forward to the opportunity to work together as a community to install these new spots for community building and relationship growth. When the benches are in place, take some time to visit the esplanades and chat with some old friends and new acquaintances. They should be a lovely addition to New Jersey Street.

New Indiana Historical Bureau Marker Installed at SENSE

A new Indiana state historical marker has been approved and installed at the corner of Palmer Street and Barth Avenue in the Bates-Hendricks neighborhood. The Indiana Historical Bureau oversees the Indiana State Historical Marker Program.

This new marker recognizes the important contributions of Leedy Manufacturing Company, which made a variety of percussion instruments on the site from 1903 to 1929, including drums, tympani, xylophones, vibraphones, and sound-effect instruments for films. The Leedy product line expanded to over 900 items, all made at the Palmer Street factory.

The company was founded by Ulysses G. Leedy (1867 - 1931), a professional percussionist in the 1890's who played regularly at the Empire Theater (built in 1892) in downtown Indianapolis. Leedy recognized the need for percussion instrument improvements and fellow musicians encouraged him to start a business. The original factory opened in a room of the Cyclorama Building in downtown Indianapolis in 1895 and Leedy began making drum equipment with Sam Cooley (Leedy & Cooley) who he later bought out and became the sole owner. Within two years, Leedy was able to buy four lots and build his first factory building on the Palmer and Barth site.

Recognized for innovation, Leedy held over thirty patents, which included creating the vibraphone, still used in jazz bands today. If you listen carefully, you can hear the vibraphone in Leonard Bernstein's West Side Story. Purdue's famous Bass Drum, "World's Largest Bass Drum", which remains in use today, was built under commission at the Leedy factory (Palmer and Barth) in 1921.

Leedy sold his business in 1929 to C.G. Conn Manufacturing Company and the business moved to Conn Headquarters in Elkhart, Indiana. Ulysses G. Leedy is buried in Crown Hill Cemetery in Indianapolis, along with his wife Zoa Isabelle (Hachet) Leedy and other family members.

SENSE Charter School Explores Mask Design

SENSE Charter School's art teacher, Warren Beal, brought a lesson to the 5th grade classes by incorporating African Masks while inspiration, incorporating lessons on texture, symmetry, composition, how different elements crafted together can create design by observing other artifacts closely. The projects also included fine motor development by hand constructing.

He led the activity by showing the students different African masks that were used to celebrate ceremonies. He stated that the project was not to just




